







Life's Rocky Start

Bonnie & Clyde

Bonnie Parker and Clyde Barrow were the most famous criminal couple in U.S. history. During the height of the Great Depression, their gang evolved from petty thieves to nationally known bank robbers and murderers, joining the ranks of other gangsters of the era like John Dillinger, Pretty Boy Floyd and Baby Face Nelson—so called “public enemies” who captured the imagination of Americans laid low by the Depression. Newsreels across the country flashed images of a pixyish Bonnie, handgun on her hip, and handsome Clyde, with his custom suits and Browning automatic rifles, turning them into the underworld's dark prince and princess of crime. In reality, Bonnie and Clyde grew up in the slums of West Dallas and had little in common with their glamorous media images. Their two year crime spree ended when the couple was betrayed by a friend and shot dead at a police roadblock in Louisiana on May 23, 1934. **1x52** HD





Blackout

On July 13, 1977, New York City was teetering on the edge of bankruptcy, unemployment was high and the city had been terrorized by a serial killer known as "Son of Sam." Lightning strikes cut off electricity to the entire metropolitan area, plunging some seven million people into darkness. By the time the power went back on more than a day later, 2,000 businesses had been looted, 4,000 people arrested and firefighters had battled more than 1,000 fires. 



Jackie Robinson

On April 15, 1947, Jack Roosevelt Robinson lifted an entire race and nation on his shoulders when he crossed baseball's color line. A supremely gifted athlete and ardent integrationist, Robinson captivated Americans of all races with his brilliant play, and in the process, challenged the prejudiced notions of what a black man could achieve. In a country deeply divided by race, where African Americans had few rights and fewer opportunities, Robinson used his enormous fame to speak out tirelessly against the discrimination he encountered both on and off the field. A Year in Space

Space Men

On a perfectly still August morning in 1960, Air Force Captain Joseph Kittinger lifted off in a helium balloon from an abandoned airstrip in New Mexico, floating upwards into the clouds. When his open gondola reached 100,000 feet, nearly 20 miles above the earth, Kittinger disconnected his onboard oxygen supply, said a prayer and stepped off into the unknown. Within seconds, he was hurtling at over four hundred miles per hour through temperatures nearing one hundred degrees below zero. Kittinger's daring feat was part of a research program that began testing the limits of human endurance at the very edge of space nearly a decade before President John F. Kennedy committed the nation to sending a man to the moon. *Space Men* tells the little-known story of the men whose scientific experiments in the stratosphere laid critical groundwork for NASA's manned space program, helping to make the very idea of space travel a reality. **1x52** HD

Chasing Pluto

After a nine year journey of three billion miles, the *New Horizons* spacecraft finally got a detailed look at Pluto, the strange, icy world at the very edge of our solar system. *New Horizons* has provided the first close look at a vast realm of icy bodies lurking beyond Neptune, relics of the earliest days of the solar system's formation. *NOVA's* cameras were there to witness the moment, showing Pluto's rocky surface in unprecedented detail and learning new secrets about other alien worlds at the far limits of our solar system. **1x53** HD




