



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

Pluto Flyby (working title)

On July 14, 2015, the *New Horizons* spacecraft, one of the most advanced spacecraft ever built, is scheduled to fly by and take the very first detailed images of Pluto. After a nine-year journey of three billion miles, it will finally get a detailed look at this strange, icy world at the very edge of our solar system. Back on Earth, a small group of planetary scientists who have spent decades working on this mission anxiously wait to receive a signal from their spacecraft. *New Horizons* stands poised to provide the first close look at a vast realm of icy bodies lurking beyond Neptune, relics of the earliest days of the solar system's formation. But will it survive the final, treacherous leg of its journey toward Pluto, which takes it through a dangerous field of debris? The Trouble with Chicken

Every year, Salmonella causes more hospitalizations and deaths than any other foodborne illness, with about one in four pieces of raw chicken contaminated with Salmonella today. Why isn't the U.S. food safety system stopping the threat? FRONTLINE investigates how and why the standards and laws around Salmonella have failed to keep up with the increasing danger posed by some strains of the bacteria. The film looks closely at the largest Salmonella poultry outbreak in history, when more than 600 people were sickened over 16 months. Delving into the complex world of food safety, through interviews with local and national public health officials, as well as victims and a top-level poultry industry executive, the film reveals the discrepancies that exist when it comes to foodborne bacteria—contrasting how regulators cracked down hard on E. coli O157 in raw beef and banned it outright after a deadly outbreak at Jack-in-the-Box two decades ago, but have not taken such decisive action with dangerous kinds of Salmonella, leaving consumers to protect themselves. **1X54 HD**

Language Matters with Bob Holman

There are more than 6,000 unique languages remaining in the world, but we lose one every two weeks and hundreds will be lost within the next generation. Follow poet Bob Holman as he travels to a remote island off the coast of Australia to visit with aboriginal people who speak 10 different languages, then to Wales where Welsh is making a comeback, and on to Hawaii, where a group of activists are fighting to save their native tongue. This two-hour documentary asks: What do we lose when a language dies, and what does it take to save a language? *Language Matters* includes interviews with song men, linguists, and poets, including Charlie Mangudda, the only living speaker of Amurdak, an Aboriginal language once common in Australia's Northern Territory. With the clock ticking and the city under fire, American officers on the ground faced a moral dilemma: follow official policy and evacuate U.S. citizens and their dependents only, or ignore orders and save the men, women, and children they had come to value and love in their years in Vietnam. At the risk of their careers and possible court-martial, a handful of individuals took matters into their own hands. The Age of the Drone

Super-surveillance drones that can see objects as small as six inches across and track human movements are starting to appear in our skies. Amazon.com plans to deliver goods door-to-door using drones, startups in Silicon Valley are figuring out how to use drones to deliver medicine where there are no roads, and farmers in Japan already spray 90 percent of soy crops with drones. By 2020 the U.S. Federal Aviation Agency anticipates that more than 20,000 drones will be in the air in North America, not including amateur operators. These drones raise many issues about privacy and safety—anyone can fly a drone up into restricted airspace, endangering lives—and although there are regulations governing drone use, they are almost impossible to police. Drones are overhead and here to stay, but who should be allowed to use them, and how? **1x52 HD**

The Day the '60s Died: Kent State

On April 30, 1970, President Richard Nixon shocked the country by announcing the U.S. invasion of Cambodia. At college campuses across America, masses of previously uninvolved students took to the streets in protest. Five days later, four unarmed Kent State students were shot dead by National Guardsmen. The mayhem that followed has been called the most divisive moment in American history since the Civil War. This event and the spasm of violent unrest that followed marked a new point in the conversation about class, race, freedom, and democracy. *The Day the '60s Died* delves into the lives of Americans at the heart of the conflict—from the students and guardsmen who witnessed the Kent State shootings to a young G.I. in the Cambodian jungle; and from Weather Underground operatives preparing to declare war on their government to the staff of the Nixon administration trying to manage a war in Indochina amidst this uprising at home. **1x57 HD**

Blackout

As July 13, 1977, dawned hot and humid, the crime-ridden New York City was teetering on the edge of bankruptcy. Unemployment was high, services had been cut, and the city had been terrorized for months by a psychotic serial killer known as “Son of Sam.” A series of lightning strikes cut off electricity to the entire metropolitan area, plunging some seven million people into darkness. Within minutes the looting began and when the police commissioner called in the city's entire 25,000-strong officer force, only 8,000 reported for duty. As employees of Consolidated Edison struggled to restore power to the poorly designed system, mayhem ruled. By the time the lights went back on more than a day later, 2,000 businesses had been looted, 4,000 people arrested, and firefighters had battled more than 1,000 fires. Told through the memories of New Yorkers who lived through the events in a hospital critical care unit, the candlelit offices of *The New York Times*, the streets of Bushwick in Brooklyn, and the pressure-packed control center of Consolidated Edison on West End Avenue, *Blackout* examines how the 1977 power outage came about and what changes were enacted in its wake. **1x53 HD**

Inside Japan's Nuclear Meltdown

The Forgotten Plague

For nearly two centuries, tuberculosis was America's leading cause of death, responsible for one in five fatalities. It shaped medical and scientific pursuits, social habits, economic development, and government policy, but TB and its impact are poorly understood. In 1943, Albert Schatz, a microbiologist at Rutgers, discovered streptomycin, an antibiotic that was heralded as a miracle cure. Within two years, streptomycin had liberated many patients from the sanitarium, but the tuberculosis bacterium began mutating into drug-resistant strains. For decades, deaths from TB in the U.S. declined to the point where it seemed the disease would be eradicated. Then, in the early 1990s, it suddenly reappeared and an epidemic in New York City sent public health officials scrambling. The disease that has stalked the nation for centuries stubbornly refuses to die. **1x53 HD**

Caring for Mom & Dad

People are living longer than ever before, and seventy-five million baby boomers are entering their retirement years at a rate of 10,000 a day. 
