In this four-part series—a three-episode historical documentary and a feature-length performance film, *American Epic* journeys across time to the birth of modern music. In the late 1920s, record company scouts toured America with a recording machine for the first time, and the filmmakers follow the scouts' trail to rediscover the families whose music was recorded: early blues, country, gospel, Hawaiian, Cajun and folk, without which there would be no rock, pop, R&B or hip hop. 





HISTORY'S MYSTERIES

Vampire Legend *(working title)*

For more than 200 years, popular culture has thrilled in the horror of the vampire—a nocturnal predator from Transylvania rising from the grave to feed on the blood of its victims. But what if vampires were real? And what if their origins actually lie in England? For the first time, *Vampire Legend* brings together extraordinary new archaeological finds, scientific experimentation and expert investigations to reassess not just when but where the walking dead were first thought to stalk the living. The documentary examines mutilated human remains found in so-called “deviant burials,” macabre Medieval English texts, and the grisly effects of decomposition on the human body as it picks apart the gothic fiction that has blinded society to the true tale of the vampire. **1x60** HD

When skeletal remains of at least 10 people, including several infants, turned up in the basement of Benjamin Franklin's London residence, people wondered if the Founding Father might have had a much darker side as the bones had been meticulously cut and drilled. Franklin was aware of the bodies in his basement, but they weren't the victims of violent acts. Rather, they were used for the purposes of an illegal anatomy school that helped shape modern medicine. **1x55** HD

Bones of the Buddha

In Northern India in 1898, British landowner Willie Peppe set his workers digging on a mysterious hill with no idea what they might find. Just 20 feet below ground, they discovered a stone coffer containing five reliquary jars, over 1,000 separate jewels, and some ash and bone. Remarkably, they also found an inscription on one jar that appeared to say it contained the remains of the Buddha himself. Some believe the discovery is a hoax, while others consider the site the final resting place of the leader of one of the world's great religions. *Bones of the Buddha* seeks to solve this mystery once and for all. **1x52** HD

When the Rio Games commence in 2016, it will be time to look back with

Building Chernobyl's Mega Tomb *(working title)*

On April 26, 1986, a catastrophic blast blew the lid off Chernobyl's Reactor No. 4.
