Hailed as a film masterpiece and landmark in historical storytelling, Ken Burns’s epic documentary brings to life America’s most destructive—and defining—conflict. Here is the saga of celebrated generals and ordinary soldiers, a heroic and transcendent president and a country that had to divide itself in two in order to become one.

Five years in production, this epic presentation of America’s bloodiest conflict has received widespread critical praise from reviewers and historians alike as a landmark in documentary filmmaking.

Producer and director Ken Burns researched over 60,000 archival images, along with period paintings, lithographs and newspaper headlines, and combined them with newsreels of veterans, live scenes and first-person narratives read by a chorus of extraordinary voices. They tell the dramatic story of the nation’s struggle to preserve democracy by erasing the stain of slavery, but at a cost of 620,000 lives. The actual historical record is more compelling and emotionally powerful than any fictional account could be.
